


Collection 02, intends to improve our relationship with the spaces we live in, through the production of pieces that invite us to inhabit through materials, shapes, colors, and textures, always taking into account social, environmental, and economic factors.

The collection explores the material relationship between wood, textiles, and the possibilities that their techniques represent. With the use of color, the pieces are intended to add dynamism and depth to the space that contains them.

Inspired by the Japanese ofuro, the cylindrical shape of the table bases is made of straight sections that are manually rounded with a kanna, a Japanese woodplane.

Each section of the space divider is finished with a thin strip of steambent wood and assembled to the structure. The textile element in this collection is made of wool felt. Digital embroidery captures the characteristic pattern that gives depth to the collection.



Designers



Coleccion Estudio is made up of three Mexican designers Andrés Cacho, Manuel López and Daniel Martínez.

Andrés Cacho was born in Mexico City. He has a degree in Industrial Design from the Monterrey Institute of Higher Studies. His work has been exhibited in museums in Mexico, Spain and Japan. It also has awards such as the Quorum Prize and a honourable mention at the 2nd Ibero-American Design Biennial. Cacho completed his master's studies in Global Art Practice focused on woodworking from the Tokyo University of the Arts.

Manuel López, was born in Guanajuato. He has a degree in Industrial Design from the Autonomous University of Querétaro, a specialist in Textile Design from the School of Design of the National Institute of Fine Arts, and a master's studies in Textile Design, from the University of the Arts London. His collaborations and projects have been exhibited at fairs such as Cinemacon, Zona Maco, Design Week.

Daniel Martínez was born in Mexico City. He holds a BA in Design from the UNAM Industrial Design Research Center. His curiosity for art began when he attended workshops organized by the Vitra Design Museum in Boisbuchet, France. He participated in a course on new product innovation at the University of Berkeley, California. His work has been exhibited in museums and fairs such as the National Museum of Art, Museum of Popular Art, DesignWeek Mexico, and Open Mexican Design, among others.
